#### **Course Theme & Description**

- Our English 1A course will center around readings and writing assignments that discuss the impact of artificial intelligence on contemporary culture. Through an analysis of readings on this topic from a variety of different genres, some questions we will discuss include: What is the difference between humans and machines? How will our personal lives and society be transformed by artificial intelligence? What are the main social, political, and ethical issues surrounding the debate about artificial intelligence? Should we be concerned or hopeful about the future of artificial intelligence and its impact on society? We will also apply these questions to our own experience with technology more generally, allowing us to reflect on the technology we use every day and its impact on our personal, academic, and professional lives.
- English 1A is an introductory writing course that helps students understand the writing process and the goals, dynamics, and genres of written communication. Through interpretation and analysis of texts,

students learn to think clearly and write effectively as they give form and coherence to complex ideas. Students practice these skills by writing for various audiences and rhetorical situations. *Note:* This course satisfies the GE Area A2 Written Communication I Requirement. You must earn a final grade of "C-" or higher to receive credit for this course.

# **GE Learning Outcomes (GELO)**

- Students shall achieve the ability to write complete essays that demonstrate college-level proficiency in all of the following:
- 1. Read actively and rhetorically
- 2. Perform the essential steps in the writing process (prewriting, organizing, composing, revising, and editing) and demonstrate an awareness of said performance
- 3. Articulate an awareness of and write according to the rhetorical features of texts, such as purpose, audience, context, and rhetorical appeals
- 4. Integrate your ideas and those of others by explaining, analyzing, developing, and criticizing ideas effectively in several genres
- 5. Use college-level language with clarity and grammatical proficiency

#### **Course Format**

- You will attend two in-person 1.25 hour class meetings (2.5 hours total) each week and you will
  complete assignments during our in-person class time and outside of class online on our Canvas course
  website.
- Course materials are organized on Canvas in a series of weekly modules in which you can find all
  content: readings, videos, quizzes, detailed assignment instructions, assignment drop boxes, general
  course information, and links to useful information.
- Note: You'll be expected to wear a mask covering your nose and mouth when you are in the classroom.

# Attendance & Late Policy

- We will be conducting warm-up activities in the beginning of each class that will count towards your final grade; if you are late, you will not be allowed to make up these activities.
- In this class, you will have **one major assignment that is due at the end of each week**. Since we will be starting these assignments during class time, a percentage of these assignments will count as in-class work. As a result, if you are absent from class, I will deduct 2 points for each day you are absent from the grade of your final assignment for that week.
- Note: Exceptions are made to this policy only in rare circumstances; i.e. for an illness that you can verify with a doctor's note. Please contact me if you need to miss a class and be ready to provide proof of illness or other unexpected event.

#### **Submitting Assignments to Canvas**

- Assignments are considered to be submitted only when they are fully uploaded to Canvas. You should not wait until the last minute to submit an assignment, as uploads may take some time and you will be assessed a late penalty if the upload is completed after the deadline has passed.
- If you miss a final deadline (meaning you've missed the original due date and the late period has passed), do not email me your assignment or submit it as an attachment to a comment; assignments that are submitted in these ways will not be graded.
- Note: Assignments are graded as uploaded to Canvas, and incorrect, blank, or unreadable files will receive no points. To avoid this, click on the "View Submission" option after uploading your work to make sure that you have submitted the correct file. You can re-submit assignments as many times as you would like before a deadline; Canvas shows me your final submission and that is what I will grade.

#### **Late Assignments Policy**

• Late work is accepted up to 72 hours after a due date, except where indicated (the final assignments of the semester must be submitted by the specified due date/time and no late submissions are accepted).

- Work submitted up to 24 hours late will receive a 10% penalty, from 24 to 48 hours late will receive a 20% penalty, and from 48 to 72 hours late will receive a 30% penalty. These penalties are based on the total points possible and are automatically deducted by Canvas.
- After 72 hours, no late assignments are accepted; the online assignment will close and you will not be able to submit assignments or access quizzes.
- Note: Exceptions are made to this policy only in rare circumstances; i.e. for an illness that you can verify with a doctor's note. Please contact me if you need an extension on an assignment and be ready to provide proof of illness or other unexpected event.

#### Assessment

- You must receive at least 70% (a letter grade of C-) as a final grade to pass this course, distributed as follows:
- 10% In-class warm-up activities
- 10% Analysis assignments (rhetorical situation analysis, genre analysis)
- 30% Scaffolding assignments (paraphrasing assignment, summary assignment, synthesis charts, outlines)
- 40% Essay assignments (a critique essay, an expository essay, & an argumentative essay with revisions)
- 10% Final self-reflection essay (*Note: This assignment will count as your final exam*)

#### **Assignments**

- In-class warm-up activities (GELOs 1, 3): We will be conducting daily in-class warm-up activities in the beginning of each class that will count towards your final grade; if you are late, you will not be allowed to make up these activities.
- Analysis assignments (GELOs 1, 3): You will be asked to complete two analysis assignments to increase your awareness of rhetorical situations and genres, including a rhetorical situation analysis (approx. 250 words) and a genre analysis (approx 250 words).
- Scaffolding assignments (GELOs 2, 3, 4, 5): You will be asked to complete six scaffolding assignments to help prepare you to write your essays, including a paraphrasing assignment (approx. 250 words), summary assignment (approx. 250 words), two synthesis charts, and three outlines.
- **Essay assignments** (GELOs 2, 3, 4, 5): You will be asked to complete three essays: a critique essay (approx. 1000 words for each draft), an expository essay (approx. 1000 words for each draft), and an argumentative essay (approx. 1000 words for each draft)
- **Final self-reflection essay** (GELOs 2, 3, 5). For your final exam, you will be asked to write an in-class final self-reflection essay (approx. 1000 words).

#### **Grading Information**

- My goal is to make the **grading process as clear to you as possible**. Descriptions of how assignments and exams will be graded can be found in the instructions, or in the associated grading rubric.
- **How your grade is calculated**: Each assignment in this course is given a point value. Once the assignment is scored, the points you earn are applied to a certain percentage of your final course grade.
- **Grading turnaround:** My goal is to return your assignments to you as soon as possible after you submit them, and you can expect that I will grade your assignments within two weeks after they are submitted, although in most cases they will be returned to you sooner.
- **Final course grade:** Your final course grade will be the grade that is shown on Canvas after the final assignment of the semester is completed and graded. There will be no extra credit or extra work offered

at the end of the semester to raise your grade, nor will your grade be rounded up. Your final grade will be assigned based on the following scale:

#### The Writing Process

- All of the writing you do in this class will be developed according to the **process model of writing** which has four steps: planning, drafting, revising, and editing.
- Various **scaffolding activities** will break down the writing process into manageable steps that you will follow to complete each assignment.
- You will submit **two drafts of each essay and receive feedback** on the first drafts from me and from your peers to revise your essay before you submit the final draft.
- *Note*: You can also receive additional writing help by attending my office hours or working with a writing tutor.
