Music is an essential expression of human experience. The purpose of the School of Music is to:

- Prepare, inspire, and motivate students to achieve excellence in professional careers in teaching, performance, composition, musicology, and related fields;
- Engage a diverse university population in experiences that foster life-long learning and a greater understanding of music in all its forms;
- Provide and sustain a unique performing arts culture for the University, Silicon Valley, and the Greater Bay Area communities;
- Generate creative activities and scholarship in music that have local, national, and international significance,

INFORMATION FOR PROSPECTIVE STUDENTS

Degrees Offered

Master of Music Degrees

The **Master of Music in Composition** is a two-year, 30-unit program designed for students who wish to pursue advanced study and practice in the art of musical composition. The program emphasizes the development of an individual compositional voice supported by a strong technical foundation in theory, analysis, orchestration, and contemporary techniques. Students work closely with faculty mentors in private composition lessons and seminar settings, while also benefiting from regular opportunities to hear their music rehearsed and performed by university ensembles, soloists, and visiting professional musicians. The program encourages engagement with a wide range of musical styles and media, including chamber music, large ensemble works, and electro-acoustic composition, providing the resources and experiences necessary to prepare students for careers as composers, educators, and creative professionals, or for further advanced study at the doctoral level.

The **Master of Music in Conducting** is a rigorous two-year, 30-unit graduate program designed for musicians seeking intensive training in ensemble leadership and artistic interpretation. The curriculum combines advanced instruction in conducting technique, score study, and rehearsal strategies with in-depth exploration of music theory, history, and literature. Students receive regular podium time with university ensembles and benefit from ongoing mentorship by faculty artists, culminating in public performances and a comprehensive graduate recital. Through individualized lessons, seminars, and collaborative performance projects, students develop the skills needed for professional success as conductors, educators, and leaders in the musical community.

The **Master of Music in Performance (instrumental)** is a 30-unit graduate program designed for advanced instrumentalists seeking to refine their artistry and prepare for professional careers in music. The program offers intensive applied study with faculty artist-teachers, emphasizing technical mastery, interpretive depth, and comprehensive musical knowledge. Students receive individualized instruction, participate in ensembles, and engage in coursework in music pedagogy, analysis, literature, and history, complemented by elective options tailored to students' interests. Regular performance opportunities—including solo recitals, chamber music, and ensemble concerts—develop students' skills as compelling performers across a wide range of repertoire.

The **Master of Music in Vocal Performance** is a 30-unit graduate program designed for advanced singers pursuing the refinement of their performance skills and the preparation necessary for professional careers in music. The curriculum provides intensive applied study with faculty artist-teachers, with emphasis on vocal technique, stylistic interpretation, diction, and the study of vocal repertoire and literature. Students receive individualized instruction, perform in ensembles and opera productions, and complete coursework in pedagogy, analysis, history, and related areas, with elective options available to support individual interests.

Performance requirements include solo recitals, chamber music, opera, and ensemble work to ensure comprehensive development as a performer.

The **Master of Music in Music Education** is a 30-unit graduate program designed for experienced music educators seeking to deepen their pedagogical expertise, strengthen their musicianship, and advance their professional credentials. The curriculum integrates advanced study in music teaching and learning with coursework in analysis, history, literature, and performance, supported by elective options that align with individual interests and career objectives. Students work closely with faculty in seminars and applied settings, engaging with contemporary research, curriculum design, and instructional strategies for diverse educational contexts.

The **Master of Music in Musicology** is a 30-unit graduate program designed for students seeking advanced training in the scholarly study of music. The program emphasizes historical research, analytical methods, critical inquiry, and the exploration of diverse musical traditions and cultural contexts. Core coursework includes seminars in musicology and ethnomusicology, research methods, and analytical approaches, supplemented by electives that allow students to pursue specialized areas of interest. Students engage in extensive reading, discussion, and writing, while developing skills for independent scholarship and professional presentation. Applicants must hold a bachelor's degree in music or an equivalent degree from an accredited institution. Admission is determined through the review of academic transcripts, writing samples, letters of recommendation, a statement of scholarly goals, and, where applicable, diagnostic examinations in music history and theory.

The **Master of Music in Jazz Studies** is a 30-unit graduate program designed for advanced instrumentalists seeking to refine their artistry and prepare for professional careers in music. The program offers intensive applied study with faculty artist-teachers, emphasizing technical mastery, interpretive depth, and comprehensive musical knowledge. Students receive individualized instruction, participate in ensembles, and engage in coursework in jazz arranging, orchestrating and improvising alongside core coursework in music history and theory complemented by elective options tailored to students' interests. Regular performance opportunities—including solo recitals and ensemble concerts—develop students' skills as compelling performers across a wide range of jazz styles.

Admission Requirements

Students need to apply separately to the university to obtain approval for university-level admission and to the department to obtain admission into the Master of Music Program. All required transcripts and supporting documents should be sent directly to the university.

The [School of Music](#) graduate program requires applicants to:

1. Have a **bachelor's degree in Music** (or equivalent) from a regionally accredited institution;
2. Be in **good academic standing** at the last college or university attended;

3. Have a minimum **GPA** of 3.00 in the last 60 units of undergraduate coursework;
4. Students from a country where the **official language is not English** are required to submit a TOEFL (Test of English as a Foreign Language), PTE (Pearson Test of English), or International English Language Testing System (IELTS) score. The minimum entrance score for the TOEFL is 590 (paper-based), 243 (computer-based), or 96 (internet-based), with a score of 5 in the Writing Section. The minimum score for the PTE is 68; for the IELTS, the minimum score is 7.0. All test scores must be less than 2 years old. Test scores must be sent directly from the Educational Testing Service office (institution code 4687), Pearson Office, or IELTS office directly to SJSU.

5. **Audition, Portfolio, Interview**

1. Conducting and Performance: a live (preferred) or unedited recorded audition is required for conducting and performance specializations. Please see the [School of Music website](#) for specific requirements of individual performance areas.
 2. Composition, Education, History, Systems/Theory: the submission of a portfolio of work is required for all academic specializations. Please see the [School of Music website](#) for specific requirements of individual academic areas.
 3. Individual areas may also require an interview.
 4. Auditions are scheduled by the area coordinators and usually take place in late spring. Applicants should coordinate directly with the relevant area coordinator to arrange an audition date.
6. Submit three **letters of recommendation** addressing the applicant's potential for graduate-level work in music to be sent to the appropriate performance area advisor.

The [School of Music](#) does not require the GRE (Graduate Record Exam).

Entrance Qualifying Examinations

Graduate students admitted to the School of Music are usually admitted in “conditionally classified” status. This status is normal for all entering graduate students, who must demonstrate a bachelor’s level competence in music history and music theory by passing the Graduate Entrance Evaluations given during Pre-Instruction before the start of the fall semester. Students who pass their Entrance Evaluations may then become “graduate classified” and are eligible to take all 200-level graduate seminars after completing [MUSC 200](#). Students who fail one or more portions of the Evaluation will remain conditionally classified and will be required to remediate with the appropriate coursework before taking graduate seminars beyond [MUSC 200](#). Coursework taken as remediation is not applied to the Master’s degree requirement units. Students who fail the entire Entrance Evaluation will not be admitted into the program.

Students who completed their undergraduate music degree at SJSU and who received a grade of B or above in their undergraduate theory and history classes are exempt from taking the entrance qualifying examinations.

Music History Examination

The goal of the music history entrance examination is to ensure that all entering students have the requisite writing and analytical skills to begin work at master's level. The examination consists of a selection of essay prompts covering different historical periods in Western music (Medieval, Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, Romantic and Modern). Students choose one prompt and write an essay of 2-3 pages to demonstrate their understanding of core repertoire and their broader historical context.

Music Theory Examination

The goal of the music theory entrance examination is to ensure that all entering students have a sufficient level of understanding of music theory to begin work at master's level. The examination covers aural skills (dictation), form and analysis (Roman numeral analysis, identifying modulations), harmony and part-writing (realizing a chord progression in four-part harmony), counterpoint (analyzing a four-part fugue), and orchestration (identifying ranges and transpositions of orchestral instruments, identifying technical terms).

DEGREE PLANS

Core courses (12 units)

All graduate students must enroll in the following classes that meet from 4:00–6:30pm once a week:

- MUSC 200: Methods of Music Writing and Research (3 units)
- MUSC 201A-D: Seminar in Music History (3 units)
- MUSC 202: Seminar in Music Systems and Theory (3 units)
- MUSC 203: Seminar in Style and Performance Practice (3 units)

Students in the Music Education and Jazz Studies concentrations may also take MUSC 221 (Improvisational Traditions) instead of MUSC 203.

MUSC 200 and 203 are normally given each fall.

MUSC 201 and 202 are normally given each spring.

MUSC 221 is offered according to faculty staffing schedules.

Concentration requirements and electives (15 units)

Each concentration has a different plan for the 15 units of Area of Concentration Requirements and electives as described below. See Appendix 1 for Degree Roadmaps for each concentration.

- Ensemble (1 unit, 3X = 3 units). Instrumental conducting students should take Wind Ensemble or Symphony Orchestra as assigned by the area coordinator. Choral conducting students should take Concert Choir or Choraliers as assigned by the area coordinator.
- MUSC 220: Studies in Advanced Conducting (3 units)

- MUSC 232: Advanced Field Experience (1 unit, 3X = 3 units)

- MUSC 224D: Supervised Graduate Study, Vocal Performance (2 units taken 3 times = 6 units)

- MUSC 242: Art Song Repertoire (1 unit, repeatable for up to 2 units)
- MUSC 144: Solo Literature and Performance Practice and Pedagogy (1 unit, repeatable for up to 4 units)
- MUSC 252: Opera Theater (1 unit, must enroll 4 times)

MM, Jazz Studies

Concentration requirements

- MUSC 224F: Supervised Graduate Study, Jazz Studies (2 units taken 3 times = 6 units)

- MUSC 259: Afro-Latin Jazz Ensemble (1 unit)

- MUSC 260F: Small Jazz Ensemble (1 unit)

Culminating Experience (3 units)

All graduate students complete a Culminating Experience, either as Plan A (Thesis) or Plan B (Composition, Project or Recital).

The Culminating Experience is normally taken in the final semester, and students enroll in 3 units as follows:

- MM, Composition: Plan B (Master's Composition), MUSC 297 (3 units)
- MM, Conducting: Plan B (Master's Recital), MUSC 297 (3 units)
- MM, Performance (Instrumental): Plan B (Master's Recital), MUSC 297 (3 units)
- MM, Performance (Vocal): Plan B (Master's Recital), MUSC 297 (3 units)
- MM, Music Education: Plan A (Master's Thesis), MUSC 299 (3 units)
- MM, Musicology: Plan A (Master's Thesis), MUSC 299 (3 units)
- MM, Jazz Studies: Plan B (Master's Recital), MUSC 297 (3 units)

THE CULMINATING EXPERIENCE

Culminating Exam

At the end of their studies, all MM students must demonstrate their thorough grasp of their area of concentration through the culminating exam which takes place in the final semester of study. For students taking the Musicology concentration this will take the form of an oral defense of the thesis research. The format of other culminating exams will be determined by the area coordinators.

UNIVERSITY GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Students must complete all residency, curriculum, unit, GPA, and culminating experience requirements as outlined in the [Graduation Requirements](#) section of the [Graduate Policies and Procedures](#). All students must satisfy [Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement \(GWAR\)](#) and culminating experience as outlined in the degree requirements.

Advancement to Candidacy

Candidacy denotes that the student is fully qualified to complete the final stages of the MM. In order to achieve candidacy, students must meet the university requirements for candidacy. General university requirements for [advancement to candidacy](#) for the Master's degree are detailed in the [Graduate Policies and Procedures](#) section. Advancement to candidacy requires that the student be in good standing with a 3.0 GPA or better in a minimum of 9 units of letter-graded coursework as a graduate student in 100- or 200-level courses in the degree program as

indicated by all courses on the [Petition for Advancement to Graduate Candidacy](#). These courses must conform to university and departmental requirements, and the area and graduate advisors must approve the proposed program. The proposed program must list a total of 30 semester units, including the appropriate number of “core” courses, area of specialization courses, required ensembles, and supervised graduate study.

The student must be “graduate classified” and have met and cleared their conditions for admission to the program indicated by their results in the Graduate Entrance Evaluation in music history and music systems/theory. Candidacy also includes successful completion of the [Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement \(GWAR\)](#), which in the School of Music is [MUSC 200](#).

PROCESSES AND FORMS

Enrolling in classes

The Candidacy Form

The candidacy form serves as a contract between the following parties:

- Graduate Admissions and Program Evaluations Office (GAPE)
Graduate Department
Graduate Student

Approval of the candidacy form indicates that by successfully completing coursework as listed on your form, you will be awarded a graduate degree. Once you have met the *Criteria for Candidacy Advancement*, you will want to complete each section of your candidacy form as accurately as possible.

Steps to filling out the Candidacy Form:

1. Download the form from <https://www.sjsu.edu/gape/forms/>.

2. Student Information

The information in this section should reflect what is currently listed in your MySJSU account. Should you need to update any of your personal information, please visit the Registrar's Office [Update Personal Information](#) webpage for instructions.

3. Degree Information

The information in this section pertains to the degree you are currently seeking and the program you are working on completing. Here you will also indicate your means of satisfying the Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (GWAR) and which Culminating Experience (Plan A, B, or C) you plan to complete. For the Master in Music, MUSC 200 fulfills the GWAR.

4. Section A – Courses

To begin, list each course in correspondence with your degree program requirements in the chronological semester order for which you plan to complete them. Then, while referencing your unofficial transcript, list the grade you have earned thus far for the associated course. Refrain from including grades for courses which have not been listed in your unofficial transcript. "In-progress" coursework grades should not be listed.

5. Section B – Culminating Experience

Indicate which culminating experience you plan to complete in reference with your degree program requirements by utilizing the appropriate "checkbox" on the form. Your selection should mirror what you had previously listed in the Degree Information section of your form. Here you will also indicate the culminating experience course you plan to complete and the anticipated semester you plan to complete it in.

6. Section C – Transfer Courses/Total Program Units

For students who have not previously received an advanced evaluation of their transfer credits, you may indicate that coursework in this section of the form (if applicable). Please review the *Validate Any Eligible Graduate Transfer Credits* section of the Academic Planning webpage for information on how many units may be transferred in and which types of units qualify to be transferred in. Do not complete the "Sub. for SJSU course" portion, as it should be completed by your Graduate Program Coordinator, if applicable. This section of the form is also used to summarize the total number of units you will be required to complete in order to earn your degree. Under the portion titled "Unit" to the right-hand side of the document, enter the total number of units associated with sections A, B, and C of the form.

Note: If you do not require review of any transfer coursework, only enter your total program units and then skip to the next section of the form.

7. Required Signatures

Complete one final review of the information you have provided. It is vital that you sign your candidacy form as it certifies the accuracy of the information provided. You will then submit your form to your Graduate Program Coordinator and additionally, if required, your Project/Thesis Advisor for approval. Finally, once the required signatures are acquired, your form will need to be submitted to GAPE for review.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Music Use Fee

All music majors may pay a \$30 Music Use Fee each semester. This fee is used to pay for the specialized equipment in the building: musical instruments, audio & visual equipment, and so forth. The fund is also used to pay for piano tuning for the Practice Room pianos, for the purchase and rental for ensemble music, and other musical activities.

***Students who pay their Music Use Fee receive free admission
to all School of Music performances.***

Building Hours

Music Building hours are:

7:00AM-10:30PM, Monday-Friday;

Closed Sunday —except for registered Music Majors who can access the building 8:00AM-7:00PM

Students who are enrolled in classes that meet in the Music Building are granted external access to the Music Building on their Tower Cards during regular hours. Students who pay their Music Use Fee each semester may apply for extended access; see Ms. Caro.

Graduate Common Room

General Practice And Practice Room Policies

The Music Building has 41 practice rooms for individual use. Several of the rooms contain grand pianos and are reserved for piano majors, some of the rooms are designated for percussion majors' use and two are for drum set students. Unless specifically assigned to use one of these specialized rooms, students should not enter them.

Any of the remaining practice rooms may be used by any student at any hour the building is open. A room may be considered unoccupied if left vacant for ten minutes regardless of personal equipment left therein.

Classrooms, rehearsal rooms, stairwells, lobbies, other common areas, and performance halls are not considered open practice areas.

School Of Music Student Communication

All SJSU students are assigned a college email address and those addresses are available to all members of the college community. Students are strongly encouraged to check their college email *at least once a day* for messages from faculty, staff and other students even if they maintain a private email address.

*All graduate courses (200 level) are weighted 1.5 units.

Grade Requirements

A grade of C or above is required in each music course for it to count toward the graduate degree.

All required prerequisite course work must be passed with a grade of “B” or better and a minimum 3.0 GPA must be maintained in order to continue with the graduate program.

APPLIED LESSONS POLICIES

Ensemble participation

ALL graduate music students must be enrolled in a major ensemble that is directly related to the area in which they are receiving lessons in order to receive private instruction. Students must take an audition for approved ensembles at the start of each semester.

Wind and Percussion majors must be enrolled in the Wind Ensemble, Symphonic Band, Orchestra, or a jazz ensemble.

String majors must be enrolled in the Orchestra.

Vocal majors must be enrolled in Opera Studio.

Keyboard majors may enroll in MUSC 260C (Chamber Music) as a substitution for the major ensemble requirement, with advisor approval.

Lessons in secondary instrument/voice

MM students may take up to 3 units of individual lessons in their secondary instrument or voice as electives (three semesters at 1 unit per semester).

STUDENT EXTERNAL ENGAGEMENTS

The faculty of the School of Music expect each student to develop professionalism and aspire to outstanding accomplishment in one's endeavors. The faculty also encourages the pursuit of artistic and scholarly opportunities beyond the SJSU campus.

Professionalism is an important trait for all music students, and it includes meeting the requirements of each class in which they are enrolled. Maintaining one's professionalism is especially important in collaborative art forms such as Music, where the contributions of each student are integral to the educational experience of every other student.

To that end the following expectations will be followed whenever a student chooses to perform in an event that conflicts with a course in which they are enrolled.

Expectations For External Engagements

Students will not accept or pursue external performances or engagements that conflict with posted exams, class meetings, rehearsals, lessons, dress rehearsals, or concerts unless they have obtained advance approval from the instructor(s) of each course where a conflict exists;

It is the student's responsibility to communicate with their applied instructor if they will be missing any lessons due to off-campus events;

If no approval is granted, the curricular requirements and expectations of the course take precedence in all situations;

Faculty will include in all course syllabi an outline of the schedule, learning outcomes, and grading criteria for students;

Faculty must exercise caution when adding additional class meetings, rehearsals, performances, or other expectation once the course syllabus has been distributed on the first day of each semester;

Faculty involved in promoting student professional activities such as conference presentations, performances, tours, or any off-campus appearances must notify and consult with their faculty colleagues and studio faculty whose courses or lessons may be impacted before engaging students in such activities at the earliest possible time;

Faculty members are encouraged to provide reasonable accommodations for significant professional activities that will benefit the student and the School of Music.

CLASS/COURSE INFORMATION AND POLICIES

Music Course Subject Codes

All music courses are identified by a course reference number (CRN), a course subject code and course number. The subject code has the following meaning:

The first four letters "MUSC" indicate it is a music course.

The first four letters "MUED" indicate it is a music education course

Lower-division courses are numbered 1-99;

Upper-division courses are numbered 100-199

Graduate level courses are numbered 200-299

Supervised Graduate Study courses for all MM concentrations use the code MUSC 224 followed by a letter for each concentration, as follows:

MUSC 224A: Supervised Graduate Study, Composition
MUSC 224B: Supervised Graduate Study, Conducting
MUSC 224C: Supervised Graduate Study, Instrumental Performance
MUSC 224D: Supervised Graduate Study, Vocal Performance
MUSC 224E: Supervised Graduate Study, Musicology
MUSC 224F: Supervised Graduate Study, Jazz Studies

Course Enrollment Policies

Registration in the appropriate courses is each student's responsibility. This includes registration for studio and ensembles. Students not properly enrolled in these courses will not be eligible to receive lessons and participate in ensembles.

Students can also find information about late registration, add/drop procedures, and withdrawal policies using the links on that site. Please keep in mind that late registration typically ends around the third week of classes. Students cannot add a course after the third week of classes without paying an additional fee. Also note that dropping below 8 units of courses may have an effect on your financial aid eligibility. Students should check with the Financial Aid Office prior to withdrawing from a course if the rest of their course load is less than 8 credit hours.

Withdrawing from a course for medical or emergency reasons is possible up until the final day of classes. Forms for medical/emergency withdrawal are available here: <https://www.sjsu.edu/ue/student-petitions/drops/index.php>.

Credit And Time Requirements

SJSU defines a credit hour in accordance with the CSU's accreditor, the WASC Senior College and University Commission (WSCUC), which publishes its own definition of student credit hour and related accreditation processes.

The CSU defines a credit hour as an amount of work represented in stated learning outcomes and verified by evidence of student achievement. Such evidence is an institutionally established equivalency that:

Approximates not less than:

One hour of direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours of out-of-class student work each week for approximately 15 weeks for one semester or equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time; or

At least an equivalent amount of work as required above for other academic activities as established by the institution including practica, studio work and other academic work leading to the award of credit hours;

A credit hour is assumed to be a 50-minute (not 60-minute) period. In some courses, such as those offered online, in which “seat time” does not apply, a credit hour may be measured by an equivalent amount of work, as demonstrated by student achievement.
